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sword it should be by taking the may's out and putting the shall's in. I am persuaded. George, it's here, all you gotta do is throw up a simple amendment, every may in this bill, change it to shall, and then all the rhetoric that you talk about will be, in fact, carried out in the measure and I will vote for the bill. You have persuaded me of the goals, now make your means in this bill accomplish them. And, by the way, this bill does cause workload. I'm sure you've read your own bill to know that, on page 2, the agency has to come up with a new form of notice it does not now do, and that's an additional workload, and that is a shall which you neglected to add in your list. I'll be happy to vote for this bill. A simple amendment with shall's and I'll go for it.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Madam President, I call the question.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The question has been called. I see five seconds. We'll now proceed to vote on the call of the question. All those in favor please vote aye, all those opposed please vote nay. Have you all voted? Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Madam President, I really hate to do this, but I'm going to ask for a call of the house and I'll take call in votes.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Okay, motion has been made to place the house under call. We will have a machine vote. Those in favor please vote yes, those opposed please vote no. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 18 ayes, 0 nays to go under call, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: We are under call. All members who are not excused, please return to the Chamber and record their presence. Unauthorized personnel should leave the floor. Members are required to be in their seats, and we will accept call in votes. Would you please check in. We are accepting call in votes.

CLERK: Senator Moore voting yes. Senator Peterson voting yes. Senator Wesely voting yes.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Please record, Mr. Clerk.
