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know if they have badminton over there or not, but it might be one of those programs where it's not necessary. There may be others that you have not named that would have undue time demands. So what objection would you have to letting there be a review of all of the athletic programs to see which ones require an inordinate amount of time? I'm trying to get in the spirit of what you're doing. But you and I know that if in a law you list a number of items, those which are not listed are not intended to be included. And there are more than a dozen sports over there that are conducted and, by the way, they're all paid for by the money from the football program. Would you be opposed to substituting the amendment that I have suggested where we have them consider all athletes in all the athletic programs? There is no trick here, I assure you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, Senator Chambers, there is an amendment up there to do just that. Is that not correct, Pat? Oh, you haven't filed it yet?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Haberman, yours is an amendment to an amendment so he can't amend yours, so are you going to withdraw yours and let him substitute his? That's the quickest way we could do it, either you substitute it because it's your motion or you withdraw yours and then he can offer his and we can get right to that.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, Mr. Clerk, I will withdraw mine and substitute it with Senator Will's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Madam President, in that event, Senator Will, excuse me, would move to amend the Beutler-Chambers amendment. (Read the Will amendment as found on page 615 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Okay, Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. This would do exactly what Senator Chambers was suggesting be done instead of the Haberman amendment. It would expand the application of the Beutler-Chambers amendment from "University of Nebraska-Lincoln football players on football program activities" to "college...athletes on athletic activities". Essentially, it has two effects. Number one is expands the scope of the amendment to all colleges, so the University of
