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PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Hefner. I'm now going to clear all the lights of those senators wishing to speak, and then I'll ask any senators to reup in their lights for those who want to speak on the amendment to the amendments. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam Chair, in response to Senator Hefner's concerns, although he would oppose anything that is offered because he feels that the university is opposed, he said a chancellor is hired to do various things. In the handout I gave, Senator Hefner, the then chancellor, who is now the president, supported this bill, and it was passed in 1988. This is the same bill. The chancellor already has supported it. He said this is needed, that it's in line with what the university is trying to do but has been unable to do alone approaching the NCAA. So the chancellor, who is now the president, has already spoken in favor. As far as us trying to quantify the number of hours, or the percentage of time, it would be a virtual impossibility. This is where we're putting it in the lap and in the hands, Senator Haberman, I mean Senator Hefner, of those who would do the constructing of rules, it's being given to them. One of the problems is that you have...one agency, the NCAA, passing laws and rules that are supposed to apply equally to all schools, whether they are large in student body or small, rural or urban, wealthy, impoverished, public or private and you cannot take one rule and apply it across the board to disparate or differing entities. There is going to be some kind of inequity. It's like the bed of Procrustes who was this guy who would invite travelers, he's from mythology, invite travelers to his house. And when you came to his house he gave you a good meal. Then when time came to go to bed, he had one bed that was one size. If you were too short to fit the bed, he would stretch you to make you fit it. If you were too tall, Senator Hefner, to fit the bed, he would chop you off to make you short enough to fit it. When you have a group that attempts to take one rule and apply it to everybody it's the Procrustes bed, it results in unfairness probably to most of those who are affected by it. So it would be a mistake, and Senator Hefner knows that, since we're dealing with different sports, different schools that may have different principles, for the Legislature to say what percentage of time is involved. Maybe football would need to be cut 25 percent, maybe basketball 50 percent, maybe swimming 10 percent. Some of these sports are not requiring the players to participate outside of the season to the extent that
