

twelve o'clock and we won't be able to vote on this bill again. That's pretty coincidental. LB 262, LB 262, if you will note on your agenda of three days ago, February 11th, is on the backside, in LB 262, it's a bill that will not have to be prioritized. It will be a bill that will come up naturally on General File. In LB 262, we will be able to consider the question of inspections. We'll be able to consider the question as to whether or not the State of Nebraska or all political subdivisions should be confined to the law that everyone in the state will be under or whether they will have their own little niche of contributory negligence, slight gross, and they will be the ones under that particular standard, probably the only subdivisions, the only entities that will be under that slight gross in the entire United States of America. If they have the votes, if there are 25 members here that wish to keep with that same archaic rule, then, yes, LB 262 will, in fact, be the law of the State of Nebraska. If they don't have those votes, then it will not be the law of the State of Nebraska. But attempts on the part of the opponents of LB 88 to filibuster this bill, to reconsider motions that have been considered over and over and over again, I don't believe are in the best interests of this body. We can debate LB 88 all session because that's apparently what the opponents of the bill are seeking to accomplish. There has been no legitimate argument. The arguments...it's kind of interesting to listen to the arguments because on General File they said, we're not get...we're not having an opportunity to consider bills that we feel are significant and LB 262 was voted out on the floor. Senator Warner's amendment is germane to LB 262 in its current form. Senator Warner's amendment can be considered on LB 262, and if we move on, get off LB 88, they could probably be considered later in the week. But, at the rate we're going, at the rate we're going we'll probably have to prioritize LB 262 along with other bills that I feel are much more significant further down on the agenda. I would urge the body to reject the reconsideration motion, reject these amendments that are coming up one after the other and let's get on with the vote on the bill. Let's decide whether we want to change to a system of law that 49 other states have gone to. Thank you.
