PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Madam President. Actually all this entails is a \$5,000 savings, but still it is a \$5,000 savings, and I think in this session we need to get everything we can. This is something that was worked out between Eric Byrd with the Fiscal Department and Frosty Chapman with the Liquor Commission, when Frosty stated that it was possible for them to be able to work out this \$5,000 A bill, which is a one-time expenditure only, within the program budget for this next fiscal year. So there isn't any need for the A bill and that is my reason for withdrawing it. If there are any questions, I would be pleased to try and answer them. Otherwise, it is as simple as that. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Smith. I will recognize Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Madam President and members, just quickly to second what Senator Smith has said. The Liquor Control Commission has agreed to do this. Basically, the A bill is unnecessary and so I have no objection to it being withdrawn.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Moore. Anyone else wish to speak on this motion. Seeing none, do you have closing?

SENATOR SMITH: Just want to tell everybody in here to pay attention to how much money I've saved all of them and remember that the next time I come in with an A bill.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Smith. We will now proceed to vote on the motion to withdraw LB 202A. All those in favor pleased vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to withdraw the A bill, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion is adopted and LB 202A is withdrawn. Now proceed to Item 6 on the agenda, Final Reading, and I will remind the senators again that they must be seated and that everyone should leave the floor except for the
