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Chambers predicted and the Cornhuskers, as part of their punishment for violating the NCAA student aid rule, would be banned from television and bowl game appearances." I just wanted to call that to your attention. But the World-Herald is concerned about what will happen to football at the University of Nebraska, just like I am. And I don't know really what will happen. The amendments that we adopted the other day certainly makes the bill a little better bill, but I still have problems with it. NCAA is still the governing body of college athletics. They write the rules that the colleges must abide by, and if the colleges fail to abide by them, they can issue sanctions against us, and violating these rules I feel certainly would bring some sanctions. What can these sanctions be? Well, one, they wouldn't have to allow you any television time. They could restrict your bowl games, and I would certainly hate to see that happen. And so I would just like to call your attention to this one more time. I feel that these sanctions could be very detrimental to our Nebraska Cornhuskers. In fact, it could be devastating. If this bill passes, the University of Nebraska would have to carry out this law. They would have to obey this law. And if they obeyed it, they would be going against the NCAA rules. Some of you say, and I know this is Senator Chambers' argument, he says, well, we have got to force the NCAA to do something. Well, I think this is a poor way to have legislation to force somebody to do something. I think that we have more important things to do. I think we should work with the NCAA and try to get these rules changed. And so, one more time, I would like to urge you to vote against this bill. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Hefner. I will now recognize Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam Chair, members of the Legislature, I don't intend to extend the discussion because I think the issues were adequately covered on General File, when we had the initial debate. Senator Beutler added an amendment that changed, that pushed back the effective date, so there is plenty of time for the NCAA to change its rules, for the university to do whatever work it wants, but aside from all of that, the crucial issues that we are talking about, aid to athletes based on established financial need, Senator Hefner thinks it is more important to do what the NCAA wants than to protect our students. And, Senator Labeledz, I don't know if you were here the day we discussed it, but this is the bill which says that under state programs where
