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just say that we should have the right to vote. I think Senator Wesely says one side is going to follow the law, the other side is ignore the law. I don't think we're going to do that this morning. I say follow the Constitution...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR HEFNER: ...and when statute and Constitution conflict, I say the Constitution should prevail. I would like to give that last minute to Senator Ashford.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Ashford.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Thirty seconds or so. Just very briefly, Mr. President, the Rasp case, which has been cited twice by Senator Lindsay and by Senator Chambers does not apply to the facts of this case and I invite anyone to read it. The Rasp case has essentially been superseded by subsequent cases and it's simply...the facts of the case are so different, in fact, Bernie Boyle was the lawyer in that case, I used to practice with him before he died, and he was a wonderful gentleman and though he never told me about this case, I would suggest to you that the facts don't apply. Number two, it's not we that are making the mistake, Senator Lindsay, it's we're just...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR ASHFORD: ...judging what the effect of an error is, not we aren't doing anything and I think that has to be a point that's discussed as well.

SPEAKER BAACK: We will now go to Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Mr. President and members of the body, this being my 27th day in the Nebraska Legislature, I would hope that the new members that came in with me would listen to my comments; hopefully, the others will too. I want to look at Senator Warner, I want to ask you a couple of questions. You can just nod your head, Senator Warner. Was there any fraud involved in this? Were the initials valid that were written on the ballots?

SENATOR WARNER: I think I need to answer that. It was stipulated by both sides that the individuals who made the initials indicated that they could identify their initials.
