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that we look fully at voter intent and that we look at a broader extent on that. It appears as though the mood of the body on both sides of this issue is to get on to a vote on the minority report. I will accept that mercifully and withdraw this motion.

SPEAKER BAACK: The motion is withdrawn and that puts us back, Mr. Clerk, to the Landis motion I assume.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Landis would move to amend. Senator, I have the motion in front of me that you offered yesterday.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I want to do two things. So that we're referring to the same document, I want to first make a motion to substitute the language you have before you before the language that is on the desk and then I want to ask unanimous consent to withdraw the motion, but that way at least you'll have the language before you. Should the minority report fail to be adopted and you wanted to pursue this, you'd then know what the tool is to do that. May I first ask, Mr. Speaker, for unanimous consent to substitute this amendment for the one that is on the desk?

SPEAKER BAACK: Is there objection? Seeing none, it is substituted. (Substitute Landis amendment appears on page 726 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. And, secondly, I want to go on and say that apparently the discussion of the minority report is in order. The Hall amendment will be in order. Senator Hefner's motion to accept will be in order. Should that fail and should the body wish to pursue the idea of actually examining all voter intent, this option still would be before you by being reoffered after that time, in a timely fashion. I would ask to withdraw the motion.

SPEAKER BAACK: The motion is withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hall would move to amend. Senator Hall's amendment is on page 721 of the Journal.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. President and members. The amendment probably doesn't need much discussion, but it will
