

February 22, 1991 LB 20

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The question has been called. I will recognize Senator Coordsen for final statement.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Madam President. How was that, Senator Landis? It's a little hard for me to do that. Thank you, Madam President. Members of the body, I think we all understand the issue that we're addressing with this amendment. Should we decide to return LB 20 to Select File it would be for the purpose of an amendment that would strike the language in the law that prohibits members of the Legislature from running for more than one elective office in a primary situation. We still would be prohibited from holding more than one elective office. For the rest of the state, this would not affect the compliance language or the alignment language of LB 20, if this is adopted. But I would again repeat that I believe it is essential to enact LB 20 in the form that would, at the minimum, bring our sections of statutes into compliance, one with another. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. We will now proceed to vote on the motion to return LB 20 to Select File. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the motion to return to Select File? Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Looks like we have a pretty full contingent, I think. Let's have a roll call vote, regular order. Let's have a check in, see whether we need a call of the house. Yeah. We should be all here, quite frankly. Frank, quite frankly, is up in...tending after his lumber yard, I believe, this morning, isn't he.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Would the senators please return to their chairs and check in. Looking for Senator Beyer and Senator Chizek. Okay. We have a request for a roll call vote in regular order.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 774 of the Legislative Journal.) 26 ayes, 20 nays, Madam President, on the motion to return.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion is adopted and LB 20 is returned to Select File. Now proceed with the amendment. Senator Coordsen. (Coordsen amendment is printed on pages 773-74 of the
