

February 22, 1991 LB 69, 88

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 69 passes. I would like to make another introduction. Senator Rod Johnson would like to recognize Dr. Clarence Davis of Osceola, who is serving as Doctor of the Day, today, on behalf of the Nebraska Academy of Family Physicians. Please welcome Dr. Davis. Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BAACK: Madam President and colleagues, I have just a quick announcement. If we are going to proceed to LB 88, I don't know if there's any amendments on that, but if we get hung up on LB 88 I am going to announce now that at eleven forty-five we're going to stop whatever we're doing and go to some Select File bills, and we're going to move onto Select File so that we can move forward a bunch of bills here that have nothing but E & R amendments on them so that we can get some more things over to Final Reading to expedite our process here a little bit. So, at eleven forty-five we will be going to those Select File bills so we can move some of those across. So, if anyone has some amendments for those bills, they should get them up to the desk soon, because...then we won't consider those, if there's any amendments other than E & R amendments. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Clerk, LB 88.

CLERK: Madam President, I have a motion. Senator Warner would move to bracket LB 88.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I filed a motion in order to be able to ask a question of one of the introducers, either I assume Senator Ashford or Senator Conway, or someone else. The reason I filed a motion was to see if there would be...the introducers would be willing to...for me to write a letter to the Attorney General inquiring whether or not the absence of any repealer section in this bill runs afoul of Section 3, or excuse me, Article 3, Section 14, says that no bill shall be amended unless new...unless...excuse me. No law shall be amended unless the new act contains the section or sections as amended, and the section or sections so amended shall be repealed. Notice the original bill, LB 88, did have repealer sections. I know in the past, particularly before we had the computer assisted drafting, there used to be boilerplate language, for lack of a better term, where we knew there was the possibility of a conflict with existing statute, and we may not have it all identified. There was language that would clearly
