SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Does anyone else wish to debate this motion? Seeing none, do you have closing statement, Senator Conway?

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Madam President. I think the bill is in the form that following the discussion of some of the questions that were presented, I hope everyone now understands that the ceremonies and the flag presentation we're simply talking about a very narrow, if you'll look at the fiscal note even, I believe it's...they've identified the possibility of as much as \$180 a year would be the extent to which you would actually have a cost, calculating I think based upon the possibility of six flags that might fall under this category. Most of these individuals who would fall under the situation would get the normal federal standards and standard rights. There just happened to be a window of a few people that by virtue of how long they served and the like that might not fall under this and so that's to pick those up. The other part is then, like I say, to give authorization to building and state and local subdivision property managers, authorization that they are allowed to and to fly the MIA/POW flag upon request if, in fact, someone else pays for it and provides it and maintains it and services it.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Conway. We will now proceed to vote on the motion to advance LB 313. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 313 is advanced. I would now direct your attention to the area underneath the north balcony.
