and the point of delivery as opposed to a...for flowers as opposed to a large piece of equipment or some other type of sale that is made outside the sales tax jurisdiction, if you will, of a local municipality. I would urge the advancement to E & R Initial.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Hall. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Madam President and members, I rise to support the legislation as well. The florist business is unique I think from almost any other business. Almost every sale they make is a delivery. Very seldom, on occasion you do, but very seldom do you ever buy anything at the store and take it with you. It's a good idea. It's long overdue. I thank Senator Johnson for introducing and hopefully we will support it.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lynch. Is there any other debate on this issue? If not, Senator Johnson, do you have closing? Closing is waived. We will proceed to vote on the motion to advance LB 100. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 100 is advanced. LB 344.

ASSISTANT CLERK: LB 344 is a bill that was introduced by Senator Smith, Will, Hartnett, Rogers, Rod Johnson, Cudaback and Labedz. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 16 of this year. It was referred to the General Affairs Committee. That committee reports the bill to General File with committee amendments attached, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Now recognize Senator Smith for the committee amendments.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Madam President. Members of the body, LB 344 is a technical rewrite of the Nebraska Liquor Control Act. In dealing with the act through legislation heard before the General Affairs Committee in past years, it became very apparent that the act itself was in very poor technical shape and parts of the act were out of date and no longer valid. For example, there were retail license categories that haven't even been used for the last 20 years and other language is not
