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nothing with regard to shifting the burden of proof, but it says merely that we are going to look at dangers to people, dangers to people, direct and indirect, and to the water supply. Don't take that out, I leave that in. But I expand it so that we are looking at this comprehensively, and not looking at it from the point of view of some narrow interest. We have...we have not gone very fast on this problem, as has been pointed out to you. For 19 years, after many landfills in this state have been regulated, we have not done anything with regard to over 200 landfills. And they, I think we're going to be surprised at some of the materials we find in these landfills. And I don't think you should be delaying this, and I don't think you should be limiting the scope of the investigation or review to simply a threat to the groundwater. If there was ever a time to take a comprehensive look at things, we have the mechanism in place, we have a study that's going forward. We have a wonderful opportunity here to really take an intelligent look at the problem, and it ought not to be narrowed at the very beginning of the process to something that deals with water supplies only. We're talking about people, aren't we? In the end aren't we talking about people and dangers to people, and it doesn't matter what kind of danger it is, whether it comes indirectly from the water supply, or whether it comes directly from the air, or directly from contact with materials in the landfill. So that's what the amendment does. It says we're going to look at people and dangers to people. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. I'll now recognize Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Point of personal privilege. Madam Chair, members of the Legislature, point of personal privilege goes first to the integrity of the body, and next to the integrity of an individual member. Mine is a combination. I have sat here all session and heard a certain thing occur that troubles me. So I talked to the Lieutenant Governor about it, I have her permission to knock down the next man who refers to her as Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Morrissey. I'll then recognize Senator Schmit, Senator Johnson, Senator Lamb, and Senator Chambers. Senator Morrissey.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Thank you, Madam President. I'd like you to look at your committee amendments, if you would, and see what
