SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR SCHMIT: ...technical problem that we have seen. I oppose the advancement of the bill in its present form. Revenue Committee reports LB 65 to General File with amendments; LB 208, General File with amendments. (See pages 820-22 of the Legislative Journal.) Government Committee reports LB 706 to General File with amendments. (See page 822 of the Legislative Journal.) Those are signed by the respective chairs. That's all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Johnson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Speaker Baack, just for procedural purposes only, I would object to the adjournment motion. I'm not against adjourning but I don't think a motion can be offered at the end of one's closing or comments opening, I guess, in this case on the bill. I would ask if whether that motion is in order.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Johnson, my ruling would be that Senator Schmit could not make that motion to adjourn but we do have a motion on the desk, I think from Senator Lowell Johnson, to adjourn.
