I have some small towns down there that do, are forced to store their grain on the streets in the fall. I'm sure some of you have towns that do similar. So that's all it does. I'd ask your adoption of the amendment and then we can discuss the bill. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Morrissey. You've heard the closing. We will now proceed to vote on the Morrissey amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Morrissey's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Senator Will, I have nothing further on the bill, Senator.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Move the advancement of LB 330 to E & R for engrossment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The motion is debatable. Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I would officially ask at this point that there be a machine vote on the advancement of the particular bill. Members of the Legislature, this is one of those bills that when I was younger, a type of bill when I was younger, I'd come and I'd watch the Legislature and I'd hear them talking about frying eggs and different issues or things that I thought were kind of silly at the time. And I still, now that I think about it, they were kind of silly. But I vowed I would not get involved in these types of bills but on the other hand, I think if we're not careful we might begin to pass something that may be, in my mind at least, not real good policy and I could be silly I think and talk about how fast weeds grow and, gee, when I left on vacation they were only ten and a half inches high and, gee, wouldn't you know it rained and the sun came out while I was gone, they grew to 13 inches and they came and they measured and we could have all sorts of fun
