

each one of them personally and many of you do, too, and I know you would join me in thanking them for their devotion to their husband's careers, Vicki Hruska, Lois Curtis, who is now deceased, Mildred Curtis, and Maxine Morrison. And one of the distinguishing features of these three families is that each one of them came home to Nebraska after their service, and after that they had done other things in their career, they came back here to Nebraska. Senator Carl Curtis and Mildred are living here in Lincoln. Governor Frank Morrison and Maxine are living here in Lincoln. And Senator Hruska and Vicki live in Omaha. And for me that says what we feel about Nebraska is that we love the State of Nebraska, and we all come home. I will finish with a quick quotation from George Eliot. "Home is where one starts from. As we grow older, the world becomes stranger, the pattern more complicated of dead and living. Not the intense moment isolated, with no before and after, but a lifetime burning in every moment, and not the lifetime of one man only but of old stones that cannot be deciphered." I think these three men embody those words, and I thank you now for voting for the third resolution to honor Governor Frank Morrison.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Crosby. We will now proceed to vote on LR 34. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of LR 34.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LR 34 is adopted. I have an announcement to make. Today is Senator Horgan's birthday and rolls are provided at the table under the south balcony. He shares his birthday with the State of Nebraska. Congratulations. Now I would like to... (applause). I would like to recognize Senator Hillman for a point of personal privilege.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Madam Chairman, members of the body, the cookies that were distributed this morning are a symbol of the recognition of Nebraska's admission to the Union which occurred 124 years ago today. They were made by the Garden Cafe of Omaha from a cookie cutter designed by Lydia Christensen of Scottsbluff. The purpose of the Chimney Rock cookies is also to call attention to the fact that Chimney Rock national historic site is a symbol of our state. It was the most talked about geological formation seen by the pioneers who crossed our state in the 1800s, along the Oregon, California, Mormon and Pony Express Trails. It is still one of the most described symbols
