But some people aren't listening, obviously. We have a city election coming up in Lincoln, hardly anybody is running. Is anybody going to go out and vote? Those of us who feel the need and the obligation and that it's a privilege always to vote will go and vote, a lot of people will not. So we will have a very low percentage of people probably in April and May who are electing our officials in Lincoln. So, thank you, Senator Schimek, for answering my questions and clearing up those little percentage things that I wasn't quite understanding. And I will give it a look as we go along.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Crosby. Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Madam President, and members of the body, would Senator Schimek yield for a question or two?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Schimek. In the last several years we have been quite active in attempts to make it easier, more accessible, whatever, for voters to register but we have not done anything in making it easier for election commissioners, county clerks, to update the voter registration lists and I have ran across several instances where the lists are, through no fault of really anybody but more of our system, somewhat behind the time. Would you envision that this particular system might be advantageous to cleaning up the voter registration lists within counties and that people might be with some instructions given the information to reregister if they've moved in the last two years or something along that line?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you for asking, Senator Coordsen. And that's what I alluded to in my opening remarks that it would help clean up lists. And I mentioned that in Lancaster County last time about 30 percent...36 percent of those registrations they got in were party change, name change, address change, and so forth, so that there are a large number of people who do need to make those changes and this would be a reminder to them.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Okay, do you...do you think that we have a system in place that would enable that information to be passed back and forth between the election officials then? Or do we
