So let them run whoever they want to when it comes to a district nomination and district election. But the final election has to be by the people in the district. And Senator Labeledz's idea is currently in the process of being rejected for Lancaster County.

SENATOR HORGAN: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Horgan, Senator Chambers. Does anyone else wish to speak on the Labeledz amendment to the amendments? Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President, members of the body, I have a question for Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Yes.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Under your plan, how many people would be nominated? Would there be two from each district?

SENATOR LABEDZ: Yes, there would be two from each district nominated during the primary, and then at the general election five would be elected.

SENATOR ROBINSON: So, so...

SENATOR LABEDZ: ...out of the...

SENATOR ROBINSON: So there could be some districts that would not have a representative, am I correct?

SENATOR LABEDZ: Depending on the vote of the people, yes.

SENATOR ROBINSON: That's right. Okay, thank you.

SENATOR LABEDZ: That's the way it is now.
