

specifically spelled out in the amendment that was adopted that they do not come under that Administrative Rules and Procedures Act for the same reason that similar types of rules and regs that would be adopted by the Board of Trustees or the Board of Regents where they have specific constitutional authority are not reviewed. All other rules and regs other than those three areas, they have specific constitutional authority would be approved by the Governor as required by the Administrative Procedure Act. The second amendment redefines, clarifies the definition to capital construction projects which the coordinating commission, where they have a responsibility for approval, actually expands that capital construction so that it is both new and additional remodeling as well as new construction. The third amendment merely repeats the portion of the language in the constitutional amendment that was adopted, the language relative to a comprehensive plan for postsecondary education. Fifth amendment is just straightening out a sentence which, so it reads correctly. The sixth one is, in essence, is an E & R amendment to also correct the sentence. The seventh one may be a little, somewhat substantial amendment, although not in intent, but it clarifies that the current NBA program that is at Chadron, it was funded last year but not in the budget, but not implemented until after January 1, is in fact an approved program. Otherwise change in programs that would be begun after the amendment was adopted on November 9, 1990, has to go through the coordinating commission for approval, but that particular program is technically, could have been funded a year ago, or could have begun if the budget cycle just wasn't, but this makes that clear. The eighth amendment, again, is an E & R type of amendment. The ninth one clarifies that the coordinating approval of tech colleges, community colleges, capital construction shall be only those types of projects as provided for the act and that is, it spells out those that are covered by property tax for their construction as pursuant to the constitutional amendment. Then the next one is the one that I modified. It dealt with Curtis as it was originally drafted, indicated it was July 1, '94, but that is now changed to '95 to be consistent with the budget cycle which obviously makes sense. And then the last one clarifies that role and mission changes at the state colleges which are subject to approval, the coordinating commission shall also be effective only if the State College Board has approved on that same identical provision already was adopted as far as the university is concerned, but inadvertently the state colleges were left out. So with that, I would move adoption of this amendment, Madam
