SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Could I ask one more question on that? On the amendment 663 on page 1 in the middle of the page, number 2 in section 19, further intent of the Legislature that the extent of the budget review conducted by the commission in '92 will be of a summary nature. That simply is to say that from a time constraint it will probably be impractical to go much further this first year, but after that is when the real activity would take place.

SENATOR WARNER: There are a couple of things that came into some of this. One is that it was recognized that for one reason, because of the budget year, that it would probably be desirable from a budget viewpoint, but also from the viewpoint of just the practical, how much they could implement that some of this could be phased...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. I'll now recognize Senator Lamb followed by Senators Hartnett, Kristensen and Moore. Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you Madam President and members. I have a question for Senator Withem if he would yield, please.

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes.

SENATOR LAMB: In committee you will remember there was some discussion about technical community colleges and whether the school at Curtis would become part of it. What would be the effect on property taxes. I think the bill states categorically that no property taxes would be used for Curtis, but the concerned surface that perhaps some other funds would be used for Curtis which then in turn would require greater property taxes for the tech college to replace those funds. And so in essence, property tax would be supported...partially supporting the school at Curtis. In your opinion, did the language which was adopted in the committee amendments assure us that that could not happen, that there would not be swapping of funds so that there would be a greater burden on property taxes if Curtis becomes a part of a tech college system?

SENATOR WITHEM: I've been informed that the committee amendments, Senator Lamb, do indicate that they cannot use tuition, state aid or property tax dollars so that the funds to
