

SENATOR NELSON: No, this is not another group of people.

SENATOR LYNCH: I know, but let me ask the question so I know, cause you're not...

SENATOR NELSON: Um-huh.

SENATOR LYNCH: What I'm trying to get at is education centers would provide another ad...let me...if it's not an administrative level, or if it's not a coordinating level, are these people who volunteer their time to advise the coordinating commission? Just yes or no.

SENATOR NELSON: Yes, 13 members locally in the college park.

SENATOR LYNCH: Okay. Oh, I see.

SENATOR NELSON: It's not necessarily a coordinating council, that was removed, it wasn't necessary, and about 100,000...this would be in the same basis as the state colleges, university, the board of regents, or their trustees.

SENATOR LYNCH: This is another level of education?

SENATOR NELSON: This is continuing education, this is opportunities in...

SENATOR LYNCH: Well, what I mean...I know, but is it another like there is a state college, what...I guess...I guess to simply put it, Mr. Chairman and members, I remember some time ago a Syracuse study indicated we had about a hundred million dollars worth of waste, administratively, in Nebraska in education. And one of the reasons was that, for example, starting at the K through 12 system, we had administrators at all levels, 800 or so. And then we had, in some counties, superintendents of schools, 93 or so; and then to help the superintendents, I guess, and also to help the smaller school districts we had educational service units developed. And then we went beyond that into the technical college system with administrators, and then into the state college system with administrators, then went to the university system with administrators, and we had an awful lot of administrators and an awful lot of people coordinating things.
