

has done, four more times. We want to be sure we are comfortable with the facility. We want to be sure they have done all their homework, and we want to be sure that everything happens in a timely manner, and we want to be sure that the shared state liability is guaranteed like it has been promised to us by these other states, guaranteed by the passage of similar bills to LB 837 in all these states before we take another step forward in this game, folks. It is pretty simple. It is really, really simple, and I have not heard...I feel I have made a fairly good argument that this is not needed, and I have not heard anything to rebut, absolutely nothing. I'd urge you to support the kill motion. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Morrissey. Does anyone else wish to speak on this motion? Seeing none, do you have any further closing, Senator Morrissey? Closing is waived. We will vote on the motion to indefinitely postpone LB 748. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 8 ayes, 13 nays, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion fails. Are there any other motions on the desk?

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Mr. President or Madam President and members, I circulated on your desk an amendment, AM0949, which makes it very clear and specific that only if all other requirements necessary for approval of a license to receive radioactive waste have to be met, that is, all those technical, all those specific requirements have to be met, prior to any transfer of the property. I guess whether you are for or against this bill, I think the amendment makes sense and, in fact, ensures that all the steps for licensure have to be met first and foremost before any title transfer takes place, I guess clarifies the opening on the bill, on the green copy, and I would hope that this amendment is acceptable, even to those who may not like the bill. It just more clearly spells out that those requirements must be met first before any discussion of
