SENATOR HARTNETT: No closing.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Closing is waived. We will now vote on the Hartnett amendment to the committee amendments. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Hartnett's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Hall would move to amend the committee amendments. (See FA77 on page 1370 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. Clerk, is this the amendment that is printed that was done by bill drafters?

CLERK: No, sir, this is the amendment as it relates to Senator Hartnett's earlier amendment.

SENATOR HALL: Okay, thank you.
