

mentioned it in the earlier debate, dealt with the issue of farm machinery. We tax farm machinery and the sale of farm machinery in this state. Should I buy my combine in Kansas, where there is no sales tax on machinery, if I brought it into Nebraska, excuse me, I would still be liable for the use tax. I should pay the use tax on that. What does...it happens in most cases, I think most people do, but what this says is that if you voluntarily report that, if you go ahead and do it, the department can waive the interest. Right now, they don't have the ability to waive the interest.

SENATOR CROSBY: I see.

SENATOR HALL: And they are asking to, if somebody voluntarily does that, to be able to just collect the tax, not any more than the tax.

SENATOR CROSBY: I see. I was focusing, probably, on the wrong thing in that section actually. So, thank you. I had one other thing, if you will just bear with me. No, I figured...number nine was a little ambiguous in the wording, at least, I feel those last two sentences, but I think I finally figured it out. Thank you. Maybe you would like to comment on that.

SENATOR HALL: Yeah, and...well, and, Senator Crosby, part of that was amended by the committee amendments as well, that number nine. It is kind of ambiguous, and what happened was Mutual of Omaha brought us language, since they are the largest, excuse me, dealer in the mutual fund area in the state, brought us language that clarified that...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR HALL: ...and that is part of the change that was made in the committee amendments. All it says is this, very briefly, and I will let you close and I will address it in my closing.

SENATOR CROSBY: That was my three questions, so thank you.

SENATOR HALL: Okay.
