SENATOR CROSBY: Okay.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...and you also do that for retention purposes, as well. But it also is to keep some representation across the state in the individual districts.

SENATOR CROSBY: And so maintaining an office, is that pertinent or not?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: If they don't want to move to Lincoln, for example, let's say that there is someone, oh let's pick out a community,...

SENATOR CROSBY: Imperial.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Imperial, if they do not...

SENATOR CROSBY: Why not.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...want to move to Lincoln, we're not going to force them to move to Lincoln to serve on the court.

SENATOR CROSBY: Physically, but they can still...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Right, physically,...

SENATOR CROSBY: Yeah.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: They can still keep their residence there, if for some reason, because there are a lot of number of people who would make a good jurists but don't want to be forced to have to move into Lincoln.

SENATOR CROSBY: When you say jurist, you mean judge.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Judges, yes, that's right.

SENATOR CROSBY: Okay. So, so when the three judges sit, though, they're going to sit here in Lincoln?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, not necessarily.

SENATOR CROSBY: So you could have them in different parts of the state.
