

CLERK: Want me to start over?

SENATOR CROSBY: Well, you're striking notification and inserting the word "death"? And then insert "and" and "minor woman". Okay, I've got that now. Thank you. I wasn't quite sure when I read this amendment exactly what we were getting at and I wanted to ask Senator Schimek a quick question, if you would just yield, DiAnna.

SENATOR CONWAY: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CROSBY: The continuation of the pregnancy provides an immediate threat or grave risk to the life or health of the pregnant minor. What concerns me there, DiAnna, and I wonder if you share it, that if at that time they're at a clinic, they're not in a hospital or anything. How would...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I believe that would be correct.

SENATOR CROSBY: Would you think that there would be some way of being sure that they were taken to some place where they have all the life support? I don't know much about those clinics. I'm ignorant. I mean, for me, I think the clinic is kind of like an outpatient thing and even in some places in outpatient places even when you're having like a...some minor outpatient thing, if there were, what do you call it, cardiac arrest, they'd have to call 911 or get a...right? I just want to ruminate with you a little bit on this.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Senator Crosby, I believe my amendment refers maybe less to the imminent death part of it. I mean, that's already written into Senator Labedz's bill, but irreparable harm is more the focus of mine and it might deal on occasion with a physical situation which, I think that's what you're trying to get at...

SENATOR CROSBY: Yeah.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...which may not be life threatening at the moment but could cause, for instance, untold damage to a kidney or something if allowed to continue. That would be the physical aspect of my amendment.
