

SENATOR CROSBY: Well, there are a lot of things, there are just a lot of things that can happen when you have an abortion, or miscarriage, or a birth, and I had something like that happen to me. That's why this kind of hopped out at me. I was wondering what kind of support things they have for...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I think it would depend on the exact nature of the physical problem. In some cases, yes, you might have to take the young woman to a place where there would be life support and in other cases you might not. It would vary from situation to situation.

SENATOR CROSBY: Now, do you have, I don't know if you're going to speak, do you have an objection to Senator Lindsay's amendment to the amendment?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Not that I have from an initial reading of that and I want to go back and look at the wording once more, but I think it's all right.

SENATOR CROSBY: Okay. Thank you for just discussing here with me because I think there is so many things that we need to know about what goes on because we talk about the problem and so on and we don't always think of the physical side of it as to what actually happens and I think we need to and we need to all understand what goes on and I think we all need to understand what happens to the young woman and to the baby that is aborted and so on, so I do thank you for...
