CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have is by Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator, AM958, this is the one you'd offered earlier and asked to pass over. Page 1572 of the Journal.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Clerk, I'd like to simply have that moved over to Select File when the bill advances.

SPEAKER BAACK: It is passed over. Next item on the bill, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have nothing further on the bill.

SPEAKER BAACK: We are now on the bill, as amended. Is there discussion on LB 425 as amended? Any discussion? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What...is this to advance the bill?

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, this is on advancement of LB 425.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I think on this bill the die is cast and we all know it. I have to, though, nevertheless, stand and express my opposition to the bill. I'm opposed to the requirement of this notification, under the circumstances, as laid out in the bill. I think we have run around this course so many times, there has been so much acrimony and anger involved in days past that despite the fact that this bill is going to pass, that the Governor will sign it, I think all of us are probably glad that there was not the kind of debate, this time, that has occurred in the past. I have managed to have a bit of influence on some amendments that I think will make the bill less bad. They don't make the bill good, I've had...I've been able to do that by participating less in the discussion on the floor than in the past. What Senator Lindsay and I had kind of decided to do without reaching a formal accord is locate those areas of the bill where we could bring about some changes. There is no way I would ever expect him to alter his position, his fundamental, basic position on the question of abortion. I think he knows, and Senator Labeledz also knows that there is no way I'm going to alter my underlying
