

and they are hopeful that the Legislature will pass this resolution this session and this is why I have taken it as my priority legislation this year. I don't want to take too much time on this motion today, but if there are any questions, why, I'd try to answer them for you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Hefner. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, it may not come as a surprise to anybody that I'm opposed to this motion and I'm opposed to the resolution. First of all, Senator Hefner did not draft this resolution, somebody did probably from some southern state, and it does not really have any significance whatsoever because if every state in the Union passed it, all it does is tell the people in Congress, we want you to do something; we want you to pass an amendment so you can put people in jail if a Legislature says that should be the case for burning the flag. I'd like to ask Senator Hefner a question.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Hefner, would you respond, please?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Hefner, at the end of the session or whenever periodically this is done, did you receive rolls of stamps to be used for postage purposes from the Legislature?

SENATOR HEFNER: Yes, I have.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did those stamps contain the American flag on them?

SENATOR HEFNER: Sometimes some of them did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you ever use them on letters that you sent?

SENATOR HEFNER: Yes, I did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And when those letters go through the cancelling machines what happens to that stamp?

SENATOR HEFNER: They are cancelled.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The American flag is cancelled by a machine of the U.S. government?
