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which is a, I think, even at 6,000, a very generous cap and would urge adoption of Senator Moore's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Hall. Senator Schrock, to discuss Senator Moore's amendment.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Speaker and members of the legislative body, I'd just like to say that I support Senator Moore's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Any other discussion on the amendment to the committee amendments as offered by Senator Moore? Senator Moore, do you wish to close?

SENATOR MOORE: Yes, now that I've got the sixes all straightened out in my own mind, I want to reiterate that what happens is that the \$60 per diem, per day, remain unchanged and the \$6,000 cap remains in there. So if you don't adopt this amendment, you know, you could have \$60 per day, 360 days out of the year. With this amendment you are limited to a total, you'd have a per diem of \$60 a day, up to \$6,000. That's what the amendment...if you adopt this amendment, that's what happens. I ask for its adoption.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard Senator Moore's closing on his amendment to the committee amendments. We'll now vote on that amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 17 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment to the committee amendments.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment to the committee amendments is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Schmit would move to amend the committee amendments. (Schmit amendment appears on page 1606 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members, I have handed out an amendment which you'll have on your desk and I'm going to tell you now that I will withdraw this amendment and if, in fact, after we have been able to discuss it a little bit, we will be
