SENATOR LYNCH: I'll read them off beginning with 98.71 full-time students. The first happens to be the Douglas Public Schools.

SENATOR ROBINSON: You don't have to read them all, if you can just tell me the number.

SENATOR LYNCH: 2., 2., full-time, 2.88, 1.95, 1., 1., 1.62, .45.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay.

SENATOR LYNCH: .20, .50, .50, 1., 1.75, 1.66, 1., 1., .67, .12, 1., .50, .43, .30, 2., .80 that's two full-time for 38 students.

SENATOR ROBINSON: How many for the 38 students?

SENATOR LYNCH: Two.

SENATOR ROBINSON: They had two full-time administrators for 38 students?

SENATOR LYNCH: ...County High School, yes, they have two full-time administrators, yeah. No, I'm sorry, yeah, Sioux County High School has two full-time administrators for 38 students; .80, .63, .90, .75, .20. So most of the school districts with a hundred or less do have partial administrators. And I'm sure they can, or superintendents, and they can certainly make sure that that person can survive in that community in that school district by duplicating or by teaching or whatever other responsibilities they might have. So there are a number of school districts that have fewer, fewer than one. You know, if Senator Wickersham were here I'd like to ask him a question if I could.
