

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I will try to answer that, if I can, Senator Robinson, if you will just give me a minute.

SENATOR ROBINSON: You bet.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay, I know I listened to all this during the debate, Senator Robinson, but I needed staff to make sure that I get it right. There are two federal mandates connected to this bill, and one of them is Title VIII of the Fair Housing Act or Title VIII of the Civil Rights Acts, which is the Fair Housing Act, and if we do not implement that, we will be not in compliance and we will lose \$10 million annually, the state will. In addition to that, there is a chance...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Ten million for what purpose?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: For what purpose?

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yeah, for low cost housing or what? What is the 10 million, how will we lose that?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: We will lose it because we won't...

SENATOR ROBINSON: No, I know, but we will lose it from what, I guess is my question.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: From the Community Development Block Grants.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay, go ahead.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay, and then the Cranston-Gonzales National Affordable Housing Act of 1990, which requires states to develop and annually maintain a five-year state housing strategy, we have until October 31, 1991, to implement that, and that also involved another \$3 million in federal funds for housing.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Just another thing the feds are throwing on us, is that right? I mean that is the way I look at it.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: You could look at it that way.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Sure, you bet. Is this just in Douglas and Lancaster County? I've never heard anything about it, I guess.
