

objections, we will do so. Please proceed.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you. I'm not going to get into a repetition of what has already been said, but this amendment that everybody has on the desk now is the amendment we're talking about. It's AM1460. (Amendment appears on page 1800 of the Legislative Journal.) The amendment, the change to it simply took out the wordage from the bill that had, I don't have it here, but the language dealing with buying, getting membership rights or voting rights in the particular organization. And the reason for taking that out was simply that when this was first drafted it was my first term here, my first year here, and I put that in there as an attempt to try to exclude Ak-Sar-Ben. When we got down here it was amended by committee. They had used a little better language to exclude Ak-Sar-Ben and that is using the 501(c)(3) language. This simply, and make it absolutely, unequivocally clear, does not include Ak-Sar-Ben. What it does include, the best we can tell, the ones that have contacted us would be the Henry Doorly Zoo in Omaha, the Children's Zoo in Lincoln, the Stuhr Museum and a zoo in North Platte I believe. Those are the ones that have contacted us, said that it would apply to them. A fiscal impact in the bill, Senator Smith had asked me about that, fiscal impact is \$66,000. That is, as has been said by some of the speakers, revenue that we were not receiving until there was a reinterpretation of the rules to include this in the sales tax, within the meaning of the sales tax. With that, again, I would urge the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. I will now recognize Senator Hillman followed by Senator Landis and Warner. Senator Hillman.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Senator Lindsay, I have a question. In looking at 501(c)(3) status organizations and having some access to use the facilities and the example would be, what if I have a membership and let's say at home it would be the Platte Valley Council of Campfire Girls, I can use the camp facilities, I can use certain equipment. Another example would be the local YMCA. Would these be exempt, these are 501(c)(3), as a membership dues? You would have access to use the facilities. Would they fall into this category also?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Assuming that they've been covered by this, and I don't know if the reinterpretation has covered them,
