

Court of Nebraska, and found still several errors in this distribution formula. And if you're interested in this amendment you'll find that on page 8 and 9 are where the changes would take place. The line 25 on page 8 lists an employee by the name of Candace Hall and a series of amounts after that. The amounts are right, but Candace Hall was not an employee of the court at that time and rather the name on line 25 should have read Barbara Noel or Noel, N-o-e-l. Then in addition there was one employee who was inadvertently omitted and so this would be a new line on page 9 and would be the addition of an employee by the name of Sheryl Connolly and an amount of \$1,317.71. This amendment then changes the names, but not the amounts and then adds one additional employee. So it changed the total amount to settle this particular case on line 7 from \$156,123.31 to \$157,441.02. With that I would move the adoption of this amendment. Thank you, Madam President.
