SENATOR MORRISSEY PRESIDING

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Before we go to our next speaker, I'd like to announce some guests in the Legislature, in the south balcony we have some guests of Senator Emil Beyer, 48 fourth graders from Springfield Elementary in Springfield, Nebraska and their teachers. Would you folks please stand and let us welcome you to the Legislature. Thanks for coming, kids. The next speaker is Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Yeah, thank you. Mr. President, members of the body, I rise in support of the Chambers amendment, which I co-sponsored with him. This amendment is, for all intents and purposes, identical to an amendment that I introduced on General File and that failed with 23 votes and only 12 voting against. I think it's perfectly appropriate, at this time, to reconsider it, in essence, because it was so very close to being adopted. I echo Senator Chambers' sentiments with respect to the amendment, I would urge your support of it. And as Senator Chambers pointed out, the guts of this amendment is simply that the Legislature passes a law, and the people out there that are directly affected by that law, when we know that they're in a situation where they are directly affected by it, we simply inform them of it. And as I argued on General File I would continue to argue now, that if the Legislature is in the position of passing bills and then not telling those people that are directly affected what, in fact, the law does say, then we ought to think long and hard before we pass the bill. I would urge your support of the Chambers-Will amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Thank you, Senator Will. Our next speaker on the Chambers amendment would be Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. President. I rise again to oppose the Chambers-Will amendment, as I did on General File. It did fail, as Senator Will mentioned. And the reason that I opposed it then, I also oppose it at this time, is because Senator Withem's amendment was adopted on General File, and I understand that on Select File now Senator Withem, who will not be here today, also has an amendment to his amendment, and
