

SENATOR WILL: The...Senator Chambers' and my amendment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Crosby, 425 is not the law, so this is not what they would be dealing with.

SENATOR CROSBY: But I mean nobody has talked to school nurses about this particular...have you, Senator Nelson? Senator Nelson seems to have a point. I'm just trying to find out, you know, who...We pass these things and then say to people, 'here, do it. Go ahead, Arlene.

SENATOR NELSON: Directly, about this amendment, of course, I didn't bring it to them, but my school nurses, in discussion, and there's been two of them, particularly at home, high school nurses brought to my attention that, Arlene, we need to discuss, and we need to help, and we need to tell these girls what their options are.
