Mr. President, I have a request, unanimous consent request from Senator Ashford to unbracket LB 355.

SPEAKER BAACK: No objection, so ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would like to add his name to LB 701 as co-introducer. And that is all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Anything else? You have heard the motion to...Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Is Senator Landis out of order? He debated the bill for a few seconds and then made a motion to adjourn. He spoke of senator...withdraw the motion.

SENATOR LANDIS: If that is the case, I will be happy to withdraw that motion. I do also have the right to close, is that not correct?

SENATOR LABEDZ: Yes, you have a right to close.

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay, then let me begin my opening of the closing by moving to adjourn.
