

SENATOR CROSBY: ...intelligently, so if you get this particular study that you want, then what will happen as far as those people? Will they go along, the ones who are against it, do you think, or not?

SENATOR CROSBY: Okay, thank you. I just think, again I go back to the fact that I think that people are afraid of the unknown, but I, also, as Rod Johnson says, I have a stack of letters, too, from people up in that area who are for it. So, again, it is two factions against each other that are tearing an area apart, and I know they will never be the same again. It will take generations for them to get past this divisiveness that they have had in...

SENATOR CROSBY: ...the last three years. So, thank you very much.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Crosby. Senator Morrissey.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. I appreciate your comments, Senator Crosby, and it is fear of the unknown, and sometimes it is fear of the known. I have seen, I have gone to the power plants and taken the tour, too. I have had my little badge on and experienced no radioactive contamination. I have also discussed with the power companies, do you dilute this waste? They told me during that tour that they don't ship any of the higher level wastes, the Class C wastes. I said, do you dilute it down? Well, no, we don't do that. Well, you don't, you don't take Class C waste, the hotter stuff, and dilute it and turn it into Class A waste? No, we don't do that. We never have done that, wouldn't do that.
