

will find out, folks. And, if we find out that we're wrong on this, then what happens? What's our options? If we find out we're wrong, we broke the good faith of the compact, they can throw us out. We've discussed this. They can make us finance it in another state, or in this state, and keep us out. They can use the facility, they can build it, they can keep us out. What if we're wrong here, that's what can happen. What's our other options? The compact commissioners can change it themselves, that's where it originally is at. They can come together and they can meet, and all five states can agree, and they can change that, if, indeed, it doesn't bother anybody. We don't need to do it for anybody. What if I'm right and Senator Johnson is wrong? If I am right, we are putting this state at risk. If Senator Johnson is right, we haven't lost anything. But if I'm right, dire consequences, folks. He's right, we didn't discuss this. I wasn't aware of the license application then. We discussed protecting us from importation, and this was one way that was brought up. The problem is the importation concern is not anything we can do about, other than other states. But the biggest concern is Department of Energy and NRC, and you cannot stop them. Those people you can't stop, and you know that. Department of Energy has no idea, I've got the report here, I showed it to you the other day, no idea. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, it sounds like a commercial, they have no idea what their problem is in nuclear waste. They don't know what they've got, where it's at, and what they're going to do. One of the suggestions is make one of these compacts be a facility for us. Will they do it? Maybe. Will they offer us the opportunity to volunteer before they consider forcing it on us? The importation concerns are the ones that we can do nothing about. Now, we lower the volume, we break good faith, we help US Ecology out by making our laws good with their compact, with their license application, excuse me. The other states won't complain, maybe. Again, uranium enrichment facility going online soon. Just so happens Louisiana Power and Light is one of the entities involved in that enrichment facility, and Mr. John Ethridge (phonetic), of Louisiana Power and Light, has been on the facility review committee that supposedly met quarterly, reviewing books and auditing books and looking at other things since this thing has been running. Mr. Ethridge knows that this increase is coming in volume, he knows that's coming. That committee can recommend that we change the volume to 2.5 or 6, they can recommend that, they haven't, they can, they meet quarterly. I think they've been meeting monthly. They could recommend that, and that takes the
