onus off of Nebraska to make that change, if they all want to vote for it, that's fine, they can do that. But if we do it on our own, we're risking breaking good faith. If we do it on our own, we're helping out US Ecology. If we don't do it, if you adopt my amendment, nothing bad can happen other than we can request the compact commission to change this if, indeed, we need to address importation. And it's been a real concern, you're right, Senator Johnson, it has been. And who brought that concern up? Who brought it up? The power companies? No, they said that's no problem. US Ecology, they said, no, that's no problem. The compact, they said, no, that's no problem. All of a sudden this might be a problem and we should do this. We should leave the volume where it is, it's been understood, it's in state law,...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: ...let the compact change it. Don't put this state at risk of changing state law, or of changing the intent of the compact. Don't put us at risk of breaking good faith. US Ecology has already done that by submitting their license application for reduced volumes. Why should we reinforce that for them? Why shouldn't they come to us and explain to us why they ask...submitted the license application contrary to our own laws, this body's laws? Why shouldn't they come to us and explain why they did that instead of us changing law so they don't have to. I'd ask you to adopt this amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Morrissey. Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Madam President, I have one question for Senator Morrissey.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Morrissey.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Senator, we've talked a lot about good faith, and I guess I'm getting ahead of this issue to the next one coming on low-level, which is community consent.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes.
