

SENATOR WESELY: No, no.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay. In your conversation with Senator Moore, who did the schools...how did they provide the transportation, I guess?

SENATOR WESELY: They aren't, I mean they're not now clearly able to do that. They're transporting the children they are able to transport back to their home, but can they drop them off at a day care center, that's the question.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay. The other thing that ties in with this, I guess they won't be doing any more transportation than they are, just dropping off at different places, is that correct?

SENATOR WESELY: Well it would be up to the school board. They would be able to make their own decision on that.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay. If they do, there was, and I don't know when the legislation was passed, but there was some that required infant seats for certain age, certain size, would they have to do into that to transport some of the children?

SENATOR WESELY: That is possible but you know, obviously the school board will have to make that decision. This is only authorizing legislation.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay. And if one district would decide to do it and another would not, would that...would you have parents in some districts saying, well, the district right next door is doing this? I mean, I just don't know how it would...

SENATOR WESELY: Well we have it now for those services itself, you know, the actual day care before or after school programs and I haven't heard of that coming up or people using it.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Thank you.
