SPEAKER BAACK: That's the maximum.

SENATOR HEFNER: So it could be...it could be zero to \$10,000 per day then.

SPEAKER BAACK: One to 10,000 or whatever, yes, it could be,...

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay.

SPEAKER BAACK: ...yes.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay, thank you for the information.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Hefner. Before I recognize the next speaker, I would like to introduce some special guests of the Legislature today. Seated under the south balcony is the special guest of Senator Jessie Rasmussen. She is Kylie Smith who is the first place winner in the Nebraska Civil Defense Agency's 1991 Severe Weather Awareness Poster Contest. And she is here with her mother, Cheryl. Please rise and be recognized and congratulations on your award. Thank you. Seated in the south balcony, were also some additional award winners in the contest, guests of Senator Rod Johnson. They are Matt Larsen and Nick Gunsmore of Hampton. And are they still here? Okay. Also seated in the south balcony are guests of Lowell Johnson, Senator Lowell Johnson.
