SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, when you and I visited I thought you said that we would have the appropriations bills to take home with us over these four days.

SENATOR MOORE: The bills themselves? Well, those are certainly available, if you want them, Senator Haberman. But if I was to pass out all of them, it would be about 2,000 pages each. If you request that, I'd be more than happy to give that to you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I guess what you're saying, Senator Moore, is that 652 that's in the book, in our books, in front of us, and in the files are not what's going to be in the bill.

SENATOR MOORE: No. LB 652 has a committee amendment on it.

SENATOR HABERMAN: And when can...when can we get the committee amendments?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, it was filed with the Clerk as we speak, and I mean it was not printed in its entirety, as with bills we introduce on any given day, as far as the actual script of that, if you would request that, I do have...we could make a photo copy of it for you. But as with any amendment that's filed of that magnitude, it takes a couple days for them to print it downstairs.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So what we're going to take home with us is what you handed out today then.

SENATOR MOORE: No, Senator Haberman. I will hand out probably I don't know how many page document tomorrow, probably a 200-page document tomorrow that will explain what's in those bills. That will be handed out before you go home for the weekend. But that is not actually the script that's in the bill. The bill...if you want the script that's in the bill, I could give you a copy of that now. But I will not distribute that to everybody because of the bulk of it.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I'll take it. Thank you, Senator Moore.

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, Senator Haberman, you will have...I mean you will have a complete copy...

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you, Mr. President. I will take him...I'll take him up on his offer, Mr. Speaker.
