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logical to do this. On the other hand, it is definitely the right of the Transportation Committee, in this particular issue, to have some input. And I would be certainly open to having a hearing, if that was needed, because we didn't intend to ride roughshod over other areas of concern, it just happened that we found quite a large increase in this budget. And it's going...if, in fact, we don't...this does not happen, we will have to come up with quite a large amount of money to subsidize this program. So I, with that, I would support what it takes to suspend the rules to have a hearing, if we could expedite the process.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: I was thinking the two...there's four bills we're talking about here. And there's a couple options the body has, one is, Senator Withem had...just vote no on the whole thing, and then none of them get there. One option would be, if you have a real concern about a given bill then maybe I would request that you ask to divide the question so the other ones can move on. The other thing that may work the best of all, if we...even if you pass this resolution, I have no problem calling a hearing for the two...the two I've been questioned about, the commercial drivers license bill, and the teachers certification bill. I have no problem whatsoever having a public hearing for those. And I would say right now that there is a good reason we could do that. But you could still pass this resolution, and as Chairman of the committee I will just have a hearing on those two, but they will already have went to General File, since the committee has already moved them, and you can do what you want. But I guess I would...there are a couple different ways you can do it. But if the motion just goes, as Senator Wehrbein mentioned, the Appropriations Committee could just have a hearing on these two issues, wouldn't necessarily be a public hearing. We wouldn't have to follow the rules of five days, we could have a hearing next Tuesday on both of these, on the two issues we're talking about, without having to change any rules then because you'd have the hearing anyway. But the body can do as they wish, obviously.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Withem.

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I'm going to follow option number one, or suggest to the body that we follow option number one that Senator Moore gave us, and that
