And here we are acting as though our major goal in this legislation is not to see to it that it is administered properly, fairly and equitably and honestly, but to protect a manufacturer. That's a very laudable goal I guess, but that's not the principal thing. Remember, printing a pickle is like printing a dollar bill. If you do not properly manage, oversee the complete operation from the printing until the sale, you're going to encourage illegal activity and that's what you're doing here. So I would oppose what Senator Lynch is trying to do and hopefully you will take a look at my amendment which I think makes somewhat of a legal system out of what we have today which is not very good.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schmit. I'll now recognize Senator Pirsch followed by Senators Lynch and Smith. Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you. Senator Schmit, I couldn't let you get by with it. You called, you said that this was to protect Senator Pirsch and Senator Lynch's constituent. I heartily object to that. In the first place, I do not have a constituent that is in that business and in the second place I think Senator Lynch made it clear that what we are doing is not protecting one manufacturer, but asking that we open up Nebraska business to Nebraska manufacturers and industry. We chose not to do that when we outfitted our offices and what we think is essential is that there are others in Nebraska that can do a good job. Why can't Nebraska companies do as good a job as the Iowa companies or the South Dakota or the Wyoming or the Colorado or the Kansas? That is our argument, not to protect one, but to open it up so Nebraska business, Nebraska industries are allowed to do business in Nebraska. And that is simply all it is.
