a loss in racing revenue, and I am sorry I don't have it. I hate to tell you to withdraw it. I suppose drop it to the bottom of the amendments, and I will get the actual amendment. I don't have it right in front of me, but that is what it is. It addresses the racing issue and the lottery.

SPEAKER BAACK: We will pass over it temporarily.

SENATOR NELSON: Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Next item, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Will would move to amend.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Yeah, Mr. Clerk, I believe I have got AM1565 and I would like to ask unanimous consent to substitute AM1626 for that. (See page 1976 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Any objection? So moved.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you. You should have a copy of AM1626 on your desk. Ordinarily, I would hesitate to even waste the 50 copies to make a copy of an amendment like this. Only on a lottery bill, I didn't want to ask unanimous consent to substitute something that you didn't have in front of you. This just simply corrects an internal reference that is a drafting error, no more, no less. There is a section of the bill that enumerates the rules and regulations powers of the Tax Commissioner with respect to what can be done in different types of games. One of the internal references on page 26, subsection (5)(a) refers back to subdivision (1)(b) of this section. The reference should be to subdivision (1)(a). That is all this amendment does. I would urge your adoption.

SPEAKER BAACK: Discussion on the amendment by Senator Will. Seeing none, Senator Will, do you wish to close?

SENATOR WILL: I'd simply urge the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: We will now vote on the amendment offered by Senator Will. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.
