PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Does anyone else wish to speak to this amendment? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Baack.

I think what you do is you say as long as this substance is legal in this state and as long as it is legal in this state, you allow that business the opportunity to do business in this state, and that is what I am doing with this bill.
