

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is adopted. Is there anything further on the desk?

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Chambers would move to amend the committee amendments. Senator, I have the amendment that reads on page 1, strike lines 15 and 16 of the original committee amendments.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. Madam Chair and members of the Legislature, if you will look at lines 15 and 16 on page 1 of the committee amendments that were adopted, you will see these words, "The premises of a tobacco retail outlet;." Now what is a tobacco retail outlet? If you turn to page 3 of the bill, you will see that a tobacco retail outlet shall mean a retail establishment which is licensed to sell cigarettes, cigars, smokeless tobacco products, other tobacco products, or smoking accessories. That would mean a grocery store. Senator Cudaback, do you hear what I am saying about this? Senator Hillman, are you following me? If you are not, I am going to say it again. This bill, based on the committee amendment that was adopted, would allow this activity to occur on the premises of a tobacco retail outlet, and a tobacco retail outlet is anybody who is licensed to sell tobacco products, so that is a grocery store. So how are you going to say it is not available to children when it can be distributed in a grocery store, a drug store, a magazine rack, any place where tobacco products are sold. So I would like to ask Senator Baack a question. We are getting close to my polygraph amendments now. Senator Baack, first of all, have I correctly stated what a tobacco retail outlet is based on the bill?

SENATOR BAACK: Yes, you have.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would it include a grocery store?

SENATOR BAACK: If they sell tobacco products, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are minors allowed in grocery stores?

SENATOR BAACK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then this sampling could occur in a grocery store?
