

I am trying...I was fairly sure that we...I mean we do have it in there. I think that it says that minors cannot be in that area, but maybe it isn't specifically enough defined.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, it is not in there that I can determine. And that is why I asked for it before I said it is not there. Based on my reading, I don't see it there, and what we need to keep in mind is that, and now my comments are not addressed to Senator Baack. We are dealing with a high-powered industry which has a lot of money at stake, and it wants to do everything it can to make money, and will do anything to make money. If there is no intent to have these products distributed in a place where children have access, then adopt my amendment. If the tobacco industry is not trying to make stores and other places where minors go available for this kind of activity, accept my amendment. All of this other stuff is a smoke screen where they say only a place where it is by invitation only and adults only can be there, and other similar provisions. But then you see the one which is like the catch-all, the premises of a tobacco retail outlet, and that could be a grocery store, and a grocery store is where everybody can go. There is nothing in here about the size of this retail outlet or anything else to restrict it whatsoever. This is a polygraph amendment. If there is no interest in making this stuff available where children are present, adopt this amendment. And I would like to listen to those who will oppose the amendment and show me what I'm saying is incorrect and provide a justification to allow this activity, which throughout the bill itself and the amendments which have been adopted has been shown to be such a bad activity that it should be kept away from minors, I want to see them justify making it possible to do this in grocery stores. When we talk about the law, we talk about what the law authorizes, not the way they do it in other states, not what we hope people will do, not what we wish they would do, but what is authorized under the law. So I'm asking that on page 1 of the committee amendment you strike lines 15 and 16.
