PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, Senator Baack and I worked on this thing, because I would want the bill to say that the minors are excluded by law. But Senator Baack pointed out that minors can go into bars, or places where liquor is sold, until nine o'clock. So, if they're not excluded by law prior to nine o'clock, then that would allow them, under the language that I wanted, to be there. So, Senator Baack suggested that we add additional language which says, or otherwise are denied access, because he said there are bars which will not allow minors in at any time. I would hate to put language in the bill that could be a loophole. But, by the same token, I don't want to make the language that I select so restricted in its actual application that there could be places where minors would be present when this activity occurs. If Senator Wesely can guarantee me that the votes are here to kill the bill, then I won't attempt any more amendments. I'd like to ask him that question. Senator Wesely, can you assure me there are enough votes here to kill this bill?

SENATOR WESELY: Nothing is sure in life, but death and taxes, and I don't know that the death of this bill is a sure thing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Based on Senator Wesely's amendment, I must continue then taxing my brain trying to come up with a way to restrict the application of this bill should it pass. That amendment has been presented. Senator Baack has agreed to it. If you have any questions, then I or Senator Baack will respond to them. If there are none, I won't prolong the discussion of this particular amendment. So I ask its adoption.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Is there anyone who wishes to address the Chambers amendment? Speaker Baack.

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, Madam President and colleagues, I do support the amendment. I think that the additional language that we added, or otherwise is denied access, is good language. And I certainly would accept this amendment.
